**Employment and Wages in North Carolina by Occupation**

The Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics (OES) program collects information on employment and wages by occupation through a semi-annual survey of North Carolina industries. The annually published data includes estimates of the number of workers and entry, average, and experienced wages by occupation for North Carolina, Statewide by Industry, the 14 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), 24 Workforce Development Boards (WDBs), seven Economic Development Regions (EDRs), and counties. Confidentiality requirements must be met before data is published in the smaller geographical areas.

The Industry and Occupational Projections program is responsible for producing future estimates of employment Statewide and for the twenty-four defined Workforce Development Board Areas. All data used in the export base model are gathered from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW), the Current Employment Statistics (CES) survey results, Census data, State Office of Budget and Management and the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES).
